Chung–Ang University

Since the establishment of Chung–Ang University in 1918, it has been a leader in globalization in Korea and has been a pioneer of education as the “Cradle of Education”. Initially established as the Chung–Ang Kindergarten at the Chung–Ang Methodist Church in 1918, it has now become a leading private university in Korea. Overall reputation of the university's education programs is very high. In 2011, CAU was ranked 3rd for outgoing exchange student rate, 7th for incoming exchange student rate and 10th in Overall University Qualification. CAU has more than 370 partner universities or institutions for international academic cooperation with university level agreements alone.

The Republic of Korea is a small country on the far eastern edge of Asia. Although it ranks 106th in the world in terms of land area, the country is a center of economic activity, culture, and arts. Today, Korea is an industrial nation standing tall on the world stage. Korea's semiconductor, automobile, shipbuilding, steel and IT industries are leaders in the world's global markets. Korea has also been host to the 1988 World Olympics in Seoul and the 2002 Korea–Japan FIFA World Cup. Recently, Korean dramas, movies, and music are attracting many audiences in Asian countries and beyond, creating the "Korean Wave." Korea's new standing in the international community was highlighted in 2010 by becoming the first Asian country to chair the G20 and host the G20 Seoul Summit.



SEOUL

Seoul is the world's 10th largest city. It is also the center of all political, economic and cultural activities in Korea. Korea's past and present coexists harmoniously—with a heritage that spans across centuries and a future that lies on the cutting-edge technology of its IT industry. 2. CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

During the program, students will have chance to experience Korean culture and society first hand. Through the cultural activities, students will have deeper understanding of Korea and an insight into Korean culture and society



Seoul City Tour

Visiting Korean Corporations

DMZ (Demilitarized Zone)

The DMZ is a buffer zone to prevent an armed conflict after the armistice agreement between South Korea and the DPRK. There are some restrictions on the total number of troops, weapon disposition, and military installation in the DMZ. You can experience the reality of the divided two Koreas at the DMZ.

Temple Stay

Students will have a unique opportunity to learn and experience the Korean Buddhist culture. The Korean Buddhist Jogye and Cheontae Orders offer an opportunity to lodge and witness the temple life of monks and nuns under a temple stay program.

Korean Folk Village

The Folk Village a living museum that recreates the lifestyle of several centuries ago. While touring a historic Korea, students can indirectly experience ancestral wisdom and lifestyles.

K-Pop Dance

K-Pop has developed from a Korean scene to a globalized frenzy. Students will have an opportunity to participate and learn Korean pop style dance moves that will make K-pop enthusiasts jealous of and understand the urbanized Korean dance style.

Korean Culinary Experience

With the success of the Korean drama Daejanggeum, or Jewel in the Palace, in Taiwan, Hong Kong, and Japan, the popularity of Korean foods are rising in Asia. The rising popularity is also attributable to the Korean Wave sweeping Asia. Students will have chances to cook traditional Korean dishes and experience a Korean traditional culinary experience.

Taekwondo

Taekwondo is a traditional Korean martial art. It is an art of self-defense that uses the movement of the hands and feet. Students will undergo and learn the basic movements and forms of traditional Korean martial arts and will have a chance to develop character and personality through physical, mental and spiritual discipline.

Experience Wearing Hanbok (Traditional Korean Costume)

Hanbok means literally "Korean dress", the traditional clothing that Koreans have worn through the ages. Students will learn about the meaning of a Korean traditional clothing and understand traditional Korean fashion and sentiments by wearing the traditional garments.

Traditional Korean Music and Instruments

Students will have a chance to experience traditional Korean music, musical instruments, and its ensemble and also try out different Korean traditional musical instrument.

Korean Ceramic Art

Boasting a long history and tradition of ceramics, Korean pottery is still at the top of the wish list for international visitors to Korea. Students will hear a presentation on the culture and history of Korean pottery. And they can then decorate unvarnished pieces of pottery or even try making their own on the potter's wheel.

- 2) English proficiency for non-native speakers. (TOEFL is not required, however, your English should be proficient enough to take courses conducted in English).

- 2) Official transcript from your university
- 3) One passport-size photo.
- 4) Copy of passport
- 5) Official letter of nomination from home university (Students from partner institutions)

3. Application Procedures

- 1) Fill out and submit the online application form (www.neweng.cau.ac.kr) by May 31, 2013 (Session 1) / June 14, 2013 (Session 2)



Student Life

1. Accommodation

The best and most advanced university dormitory in Korea, Blue Mir Hall was built using Mondrian abstract art that balances symmetry and order and is one of the newest landmarks of Chung–Ang University. This residential building is surrounded by a small natural forested environment. The building is equipped with the state of the art air conditioning and heating system, wireless high speed internet access, a large dining area, fitness center, café and a lounge. Each room is fitted with two twin beds, two desks, an air conditioner/heater, and bathroom with a shower. Students wish to stay in the dormitory should check the housing option when submit they application form by May 15, 2013 (Session 1) And June 14, 2013 (Session 2)

2. Health Insurance

Health Insurance is required for all international students attending Chung–Ang University. If they do not carry a proper accident and health insurance policy whose benefits match or exceed \$20,000 respectively, they must purchase a health insurance policy in Korea. We highly recommend students purchase the insurance offered by CAU as it is usually much more affordable than insurance purchased abroad. It is also a sufficient short–term policy to cover students for the duration of our program

3. Visa

Foreign nationals of those countries with which Korea has signed a visa waiver agreement (U.S, Most European countries, Japan, etc) can enter Korea and participate in the ISP without a visa for duration of up to 90–days. 


Review of International Summer Program


